### Lexington LWV Annual Meeting

Saturday, April 16, Conference Room C of the central branch of the Lexington Public Library was full of League members gathered at a breakfast meeting to take care of annual business and listen to guest speaker Steve Kay, Lexington vice mayor.

The League group elected the 2016-17 officers and board that included:

The 2017 nominating committee is Diana Clewett and Carolyn Holmes who welcome any member volunteers willing to join them.

The program for 2016-17 was discussed and accepted by the members. It will be centered on two objectives: 1.) to establish a bridge for the next generation to carry on the work of the League and 2.) to get out the vote in the upcoming election season.

Events in the planning stage (details to be announced late summer) include:

**August**—annual wine/cheese open house and membership event

**September**—structured discussions with representatives of the millennial and gen X age groups to identify issues important to them that are related to the LWV mission

**October**—candidate forums for 6th Congressional District, KY Supreme Court, Lexington Urban County Council and KY House of Representatives

After the conclusion of the annual business agenda, Lexington Vice Mayor Steve Kay joined members to review highlights of the year in Lexington and to discuss the status of current issues and challenges.

The vice mayor reviewed the budget process, the next stage of Lexington's bike trails, the status of Centre Point and the accomplishments of the Office for Homelessness Prevention and the affordable housing trust fund. He commended the concerted effort which has cut chronic homeless numbers 50% and offers many options for housing, job training and treatment for community members formerly dependent on charity.

Then the vice mayor opened up the session for questions and answers that covered topics as varied as infill development and proposed cuts to state funding.

All agreed it was an enjoyable morning spent with friends old and new and a wonderful learning opportunity.

The forum was co-sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Lexington Education Fund, The Frankfort/Lexington (KY) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated and the Lexington Public Library.

The League regrets that it could not host a forum for Republican candidates for the Sixth Congressional Primary, following national League of Women Voters guidelines and state League policy. Federal Communication Commission Rules preclude broadcasting a debate with only one candidate and Federal Elections Commission Rules suggest hosting a debate with only one candidate could be construed as a contribution to that candidate. The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan organization. Candidate Roger Brill was available but Candidate Andy Barr was not. We see this as a lost opportunity for voters to learn more about the candidates prior to the election. Voters are encouraged to check candidate web sites, look for other media coverage and check the League's online Vote411 Voter Guide after May 5 to learn more about the candidates.

## VOTE411 Brings New Information to Fayette County Voters

The Lexington League is sponsoring a Voter Guide using **VOTE411** this year for the first time. This online guide is hosted by the national LWV and provides information to citizens across the country. Voters can access it at: [www.vote411.org](http://www.vote411.org).

With this voter guide, citizens can see the races on their ballot, compare candidates' positions side-by-side, and print out a "ballot" as a reminder to take with them to the polls on Election Day. This information site can be especially helpful for military and overseas voters.

Our local League is working to encourage more voters to register and vote in this year's elections. One of our target audiences is younger voters who get their news and information online. The **VOTE411** guide has several questions covering issues of importance to younger citizens.






