The LWV Position on Immigration and What We Can Do



The national LWV president, Chris Carson, issued the following statement in response to President Trump's immigration ban:

"The League of Women Voters is opposed to the deportation of non-criminal undocumented immigrants.

The League supports cities, towns, counties and states that make a decision not to cooperate with federal deportation and enforcement actions that include non-criminal undocumented immigrants. Moreover, the Trump administration's orders are of dubious legality.

It is simply wrong, and a perversion of the American system of justice, for the Executive Branch to refuse to obey federal court orders.

The LWV is opposed to discrimination, including discrimination in immigration, based on religion. The Trump administration's orders appear to be targeted at Muslims and immigrants from majority-Muslims nations."

So what can we, as local League members do? Here are some ideas. Keep in mind phone calls are more effective than emails but organized efforts like petitions also carry weight.

On Tuesday, Jan. 31, a community gathering focused on the refugee and immigrant issue was held at Christ Church Cathedral. Several LWV members attended. Encouragement was given to call congressional representatives to tell them why we are committed to supporting refugees. Rep. Barr's number is 202-225-4706. Sen. McConnell's is 202-224-2541. (If you have not called a legislative representative yet, it is very easy. A staff member will answer the call, take your identifying information and your message. That is it. 

LWV Felony Disenfranchisement Report Is Released

The LWV of Kentucky has just released its 2017 report Felony Disenfranchisement in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This report is an updated version of similar studies conducted in 2006 and 2013.

According to this report Kentucky has the third highest rate of citizens and the highest rate of African Americans who have lost their right to vote despite completing their full felony sentence.

Kentucky is one of only four states to enforce lifetime voting bans on all persons with felony convictions. This policy results in the disenfranchisement of over 312,000 residents, an increase of more than 68,000 since the 2013 report was published.


