## President's Letter

In February, the League of Women Voters celebrated its 100th anniversary at the Capitol Rotunda in Frankfort. Songs of the suffrage movement filled the air, female Legislators were honored with suffrage sashes, and Governor Beshear joined the celebration, with a proclamation. I was honored to be able to share an update about the Voter Photo ID Bill (SB2). This bill creates barriers to voting, when we need to be making it easier for people to vote since only about 1 in 3 people vote. The good news is that this will not affect the primary election in May.

Another issue that is in the news is voter disenfranchisement. As one of only 3 states that permanently disenfranchises people that have committed a felony, the League has been addressing restoration of civil rights to persons who have a prior felony conviction. With the Governor's partial pardon that restores voting rights to over 140,000 Kentuckians, the League has much work to do to share this information and help these citizens register to vote. # Students Win Essay Contest,

Ever wonder why 18 to 29-year-olds have lower voting rates than all other age groups? The U.S. Election Project, which analyzes census data, found that voters ages 18-29 consistently have a voting rate that is at least 20 percentage points lower than all older voting age groups. To determine the reasons, almost 50 Lexington high school students researched and interviewed potential voters ages 18-29 for the students' essays in this year's League of Women Voters of Lexington's annual Essay Contest.

The students found that young people often don't vote because they don't know how to register, they feel uninformed about the candidates, and/or they can't get to the polls for work or transit reasons. One young voter commented, "It's such a tedious process to get registered." Another young voter, when asked why she hadn't voted, stated it was because she "was in college." Based on the findings from the students' essays, the LWV of Lexington is kicking off a city-wide high school voter registration campaign, called **We Vote!** See below for details on how you can get involved.
