

REMINDER ABOUT MEMBERSHIP

Members are encouraged to <u>renew before June 1</u> so that the annual report is accurate when sent to national in June. To help facilitate payment, a membership form, which can be printed and mailed, accompanies this issue of the VOTER. There is no longer a national membership category. All dues must be made payable to the Lexington LWV and <u>not</u> the national League. National League bills the local League for the number of members submitted on the June report.

CITIZEN ALERT! If you have a smart phone, try the app "5 Calls" to help you make your voice heard. It is free and easy to install and use. It will ask for your zip code and give you a menu of important topics to select from. Choose a topic, read the accompanying information as well as a suggested message. Then click on the link to the appropriate legislator(s) or committee to call. The app also contains a quick report function that allows you to record whether a message was given to an individual or left as a voice message. The idea is that anyone can make "5 calls" before breakfast!

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LWV Speaks up about Immigration

Washington, DC – The League of Women Voters president, **Chris Carson**, issued the following statement in response to President Trump's immigration ban:

"The League of Women Voters is opposed to deportation of non-criminal undocumented immigrants.

The League supports cities, towns, counties and states that make a decision not to cooperate with federal deportation and enforcement actions that include non-criminal undocumented immigrants. Moreover, the Trump Administration's orders are of dubious legality.

It is simply wrong, and a perversion of the American system of justice, for the Executive Branch to refuse to obey federal court orders.


The LWV is opposed to discrimination, including discrimination in immigration, based on religion. The Trump Administration's orders appear to be targeted at Muslims and immigrants from majority-Muslims nations."



An executive order that would have temporarily banned immigrants from several Muslim-majority countries and halted acceptance of refugees remains held up in the court. States have also filed legal challenges against an order to withhold some federal funding from cities refusing to cooperate with immigration authorities. These are cities often referred to as "Sanctuary Cities."

These legal cases will work their way through the court system, possibly even to the Supreme Court. In the meantime, there are frequent reports of roundups and deportation of immigrants. Such actions are leading to more legal challenges on behalf of individuals. The League encourages members to continue to speak up for immigrants and refugees at both the local and national level.

"The Coldest Winter: America and the Korean War" by David Halberstam is the selection for the meeting of the LWV book club on **Tuesday, May 16.**

On June 25, 1950, half a million North Korean Communist troops poured across the 38th parallel into South Korea, launching a conflict that would last three years and result in the deaths of two million people. The conflict

has been called a war of blunders. This book tells the story of the politics and personalities behind the war.
