Matt Bevin and Jack Conway, candidates for governor, will meet in a debate on Sunday, Oct. 25 at 6:00 p.m. at EKU's Center for the Arts in Richmond. The debate is co-sponsored by EKU, the Kentucky League of Women Voters, and CBS affiliates WLKY-TV Louisville and WKYT-TV Lexington. Both stations will broad-cast the program live and live stream the debate on their websites. Other stations will also broadcast the event including WYMT, WBKO, WPSD, WLWT, and WSAZ.

This forum is free and open to the public but tickets are required. Tickets can be reserved by emailing kentuckylwv@gmail.com or calling 502-875-6481 no later than Oct. 20. Reserved tickets may be picked up from state League members in the lobby the evening of the debate. Members may bring guests. Just be sure to reserve enough tickets.

#### Lt. Governor Forum Provides Candidates Opportunity to Speak Up on Issues

On Wednesday evening, September 23, the two candidates for lieutenant governor—Democrat Sannie Overly and Republican Jenean Hampton—clearly defined themselves and their platforms as they answered questions posed by the moderators and members of the public viewing the forum online. The Anne Hart Raymond Center auditorium at Midway University was filled for the event with faculty and students, LWV members and guests, as well as candidates' staff and supporters and members of the media.

Moderators Vicki Dortch of WLKY and Bill Bryant of WKYT posed questions using the League format and time limits. Each candidate had two minutes to respond to each question, with additional time allowed if follow up was necessary. After some mike adjustments prior to broadcast time, the program proceeded uninterrupted.

The candidates took differing positions on such topics as early childhood education and childcare, public education standards, Kentucky's state health care exchange (KYNECT), ways to improve the state's economy and jobs, solutions to the state employee pension problems, and ways to improve Kentucky's overall health rating (47th). The forum provided a way for citizens to examine the differences in the candidates' views, priorities and plans for the next administration to effectively address the needs of the Commonwealth.

Now the League will focus its efforts on the gubernatorial forum at EKU on Sunday, Oct. 25 at 6 p.m.

Included in the participants will be Pulitzer Prizewinning author Jon Meacham, the first female African-American reporter Dorothy Gilliam, and national correspondent and author of newly published Give Us the Ballot Ari Berman.

Additional guest speakers will include David Becker, director of election initiatives for the Pew Charitable Trusts and the Hon. Pedro A. Cortes, secretary of state for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; retired U.S. District Judge Jennifer Coffman, Judge Robert Hunter of the NC Court of Appeals, NC voting rights attorney Daniel Donovan, and Josh Douglas of the UK College of Law; former Lexington mayor Pam Miller, KY Lieutenant governor Crit Luallen and former KY secretary of state Trey Grayson.
