Transylvania University Alpha Lambda Delta spent the last week of August engaged in service to the community, with a special emphasis on voter registration. The week began with a voter registration training session, including practicing asking people to register.

"The scenarios we practiced really prepared us for problems and situations we actually encountered," said Ashley Watson, sophomore.

On Monday the group registered UK students to become voters as the students returned from a morning of service in the community.

On Wednesday the group offered voter registration for first year students at Transylvania University during student lunch and dinner times.

Karen Anderson, the Coordinator of Community Service and Civic Engagement at Transy and vice president of the Lexington LWV reported that the team of industrious students completed 27 hours of service to the League and collected a total of 45 registration cards.

In appreciation the League treated the students to pizza at Joe Bologna's. The students shared insights on how to improve outreach to college students and expressed an interest in future joint efforts, especially working with high school voter registration drives.

Come to Consensus

On Saturday, September 21 at 9:00 a.m., LWV members will meet to come to consensus on the questions below. When our answers are complete they will be sent to the state League to be compiled with responses from other chapters into the state LWV position on the topic of civics education.

The Role of Kentucky Schools in a Democracy

- 1. Should schools prepare students to be informed and engaged citizens?
- 2. Should civics education be focused on knowledge and understanding of governments (e.g., U.S.—local, state, and national and other forms), including their structures, functions, and effects?
- 3. Should civics include preparing students with the skills to participate critically and solve problems in civic life?
- 4. Should schools provide practice in working cooperatively as a community of citizens with rights and responsibilities?
- 5. Should civics be taught as a separate course (e.g., 10th grade civics), or should civics be integrated with history, geography, and economics throughout elementary, middle, and high school?

Should high school graduates have learned the following?

- 6. The ability to influence the legislative process on an issue of importance to themselves as well as others;
- 7. To be responsible citizens involved in providing for the general welfare;
- 8. The skills, inclinations, and self-confidence to participate as informed citizens in the electoral, legislative, judicial, and administrate processes of government;
- 9. To work on projects cooperatively in various size group activities;
- 10. To understand the effects of voting on their own and others lives.

Saturday, September 28 from 10 to noon (followed by potluck lunch) at Masjid Bilal Mosque 1545 Russell Cave Rd.


"The Prophet's Words to the Christians of the World"
