
On Friday, July 21, LWV members Jenn Jackson, Cindy Heine, Nancy Chessar, Theresa McCarty, and Judy and Skip Johnson helped new citizens and members of their families register to vote. The 39 successful applicants for citizenship came from 20 different countries, some large and familiar like Mexico and India, and others small and unfamiliar like Mauritania and Burundi.

The ceremony preceding registration was conducted by the honorable Hanly A. Ingram, magistrate judge, and the pledge of allegiance was proudly led by his young sons, Daniel and James. **Jenn Jackson**, representing the League, along with representatives from the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution, congratulated the applicants on completing the arduous naturalization process.

Afterwards, the new citizens enthusiastically welcomed assistance registering to vote using paper applications, cellphones, laptops from the office of the Secretary of State and take-home registration forms. The next naturalization ceremony will be Friday, November 16.

The idea is to keep government transparent and to monitor actions related to national, state or local League positions. League members attend government meetings to learn what their government is doing and check whether those meetings are conducted in an open and transparent way, a hallmark of our democracy. Finally, observers monitor actions that are related to national, state or local league positions or programs and report to the league if action is necessary.


Do You Think It Is Easy for Ex-Felons to Get Voting Rights Restored?

The process for restoration of voting rights as it is now employed in Kentucky is not simple:

- When an eligible felon is released from prison the Secretary of State's office sends him/her information about the restoration process and an application form (however, only the names of released felons are given to the Secretary of State—no contact information is provided).
- When an ex-felon has completed the application form and it is approved by the Dept. of Corrections, the form is sent to the Governor's office.
- We have tried and, so far, have obtained little insight into what happens once applications reach that office—what decisions are made about which applications to accept and why some are approved and others are not. (Between Dec. 8, 2015 and Mar. 1, 2018 the Dept. of Corrections reports having sent 1459 applications to the Governor. We have confirmation from the Secretary of State's office of 788 executive orders for restoration. We do not know what happened to the rest of the applications.)
- A representative of the Dept. of Corrections explained the final part of the restoration process this way:
 - 1. After the Governor reviews and approves a felon's application, he then signs an Executive Order and a certificate for them, stating that their Civil Rights have been restored.
 - 2. He then forwards these documents to the office of the Secretary of State. She will sign the Executive Order and copies of these documents will be filed in her department.
 - 3. After the Order has both signatures, the Secretary of State will send the original application, Executive Order, and Certificate to us, here at the Department of Corrections. We will file a copy of them, then forward the felon's Order and certificate to them (along with a voter registration card) at their home address. Once the applicant has received these documents in the mail, they can register to vote!

Understanding this process is necessary if we in the League plan to propose ideas to simplify it.
